

JOHNSON COUNTY CRIME STOPPERS

YEAR END REPORT **2017**

Executive Summary

The success of a Crime Stoppers program cannot be purely judged on statistics. However, since 1983 tips coming in over the Crime Stoppers hotline and website in Johnson County have resulted in excess of \$112,700 in rewards being paid to anonymous tipsters. These tips have resulted in the recovery of over \$865,000 worth of stolen property and narcotics, 523 law breaking individuals being arrested, and over 870 cases being cleared.

Johnson County Crime Stoppers Program has two operational programs with rewards paid up to \$1,000 for tips that result in an arrest and/or charges filed. Collectively, in 2017 these programs received **186** tips and paid out **19** rewards valued at **\$3,575** for a variety of offenses.

<u>The Community Program – 2017</u>

Countywide, **7** arrests were made - of which **4** were wanted fugitives, **7** cases were cleared with **\$2,275** in rewards paid in 2017. In addition, Crime Stoppers assisted in the recovery of stolen property and narcotics valued at **\$23,100** including **1** vehicle and seized **25** weapons.

The Campus Program – 2017

The Safe School Program is available to **17,627*** secondary students in **29** secondary schools within **9** Johnson County school districts. This program allows students to provide anonymous tips that will aid school administration and local law enforcement in solving crimes. The students in Johnson County receive a monetary reward of \$100 if the tip proves instrumental in solving the crime. The Johnson County Safe School Program paid **\$1,300** in rewards to students in 2017. Campus Crime Stoppers promotes school spirit, pride and responsibility and allows students to take action against victimization and crime in their school.



Community Program Rewards 2016/2017 Comparison



April-June

Union Pacific Foundation Grant Awarded





On April 6, 2017 Johnson County Crime Stoppers was awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Union Pacific Foundation. The grant was used to

purchase a McGruff the Crime Dog costume. The costume is specifically designed for prevention education use in the areas of crime, violence, and/or substance abuse and will be used at community outreach events and in conjunction with the Safe School Program for students.

Six safe school rewards were paid for drug tips this month.

July-September

Received a tip resulting in the recovery of a stolen 4-wheeler. The tipster received \$250 for their tip information.

October-December

Information from a tip was received resulting in several subjects being arrested for multiple home burglaries throughout Johnson County with over \$20,000 in property recovered. The tipster received \$750 for their tip information.

Three safe school rewards were paid for drug tips this month.

Crime Stoppers Receives State Awards

On October 19, 2017, Johnson County Crime Stoppers received two awards from the Office of the Governor, Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council. The first award was the 2016 Newsprint Competition, Best General Newsprint for the Cleburne Times-Review article "Tipped Off" written by Jessica Pounds. This award recognizes the best overall Crime Stoppers organization related news article. Nominations are judged on quality, conciseness, and originality. In addition, Johnson County Crime Stoppers board member Donna Pace was presented with the 2016 Board Member of the Year award. The Board Member of the Year award honors one individual, who has demonstrated outstanding service through enthusiasm, passion, and commitment to their local Crime Stoppers organization and has positively impacted their community. The awards were presented during the 29th Annual Texas Crime Stoppers Conference held in Seguin, Texas.

Johnson County Crime Stoppers 2017 Volunteer Hours = 977

HOTLINES - To submit an anonymous tip, please contact our hotline **800-794-TIPS (8477)** or **817-295-LEAD (5323).** The call center is staffed seven days a week, 24 hours a day by trained call takers. There is no Caller ID, calls are not recorded, and call takers do not ask for any personal information in order to maintain the tipsters' anonymity.

WEB TIPS - In addition to calling the hotlines, the ability to receive Crime Stoppers tips online is another feature of the Crime Stoppers program. Tipsters may go to www.jccstexas.org and click anywhere on the banner across the top or the "Submit a Web Tip" button on the left side of the page. The tipster will then be instructed to answer detailed questions about the crime that occurred and any potential suspects. When finished, the tip will be submitted to the Crime Stoppers database and passed on to the property authorities. No email address is required to submit a tip and the IP address of the computer is not recorded in order to maintain the tipsters' anonymity.

MOBILE APP TIPS - Starting in 2011, tipsters could contact Crime Stoppers using their smart phone. Tipsters are instructed to download the 'P3 Tips' mobile app for free from the Apple App Store or Android Market. Through the app, unlimited message length is available and tipsters may also submit images and videos. As with all other methods to submit tips, Crime Stoppers does not collect any personal information about the tipster through the mobile application.
